## A BILL

To address behavioral health and well-being among education professionals and other school staff.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Supporting the Mental
- 5 Health of Educators and Staff Act of 2023".
- 6 SEC. 2. DISSEMINATION OF BEST PRACTICES.
- 7 Not later than 2 years after the date of enactment
- 8 of this Act, the Secretary of Health and Human Services
- 9 (referred to in this Act as the "Secretary"), in consulta-

1	tion with the Secretary of Education, shall identify and
2	disseminate evidence-based or evidence-informed best
3	practices for—
4	(1) preventing suicide and improving mental
5	health and resiliency among education professionals
6	and other school staff; and
7	(2) training education professionals and other

9	maintain, and promote their mental health.

5	(b) REPORTING.—Not later than 2 years after the
6	date of enactment of this Act, the Secretary shall provide
7	to the Congress an update on the activities and outcomes
8	of the initiative under subsection (a), including a descrip-
9	tion of quantitative and qualitative metrics used to evalu-
10	ate such activities and outcomes.
11	(c) Authorization of Appropriations.—To carry
12	out this section, there is authorized to be appropriated
13	\$10,000,000 for each of fiscal years 2023 through 2025.
14	SEC. 4. PROGRAMS TO PROMOTE MENTAL HEALTH AMONG
15	THE EDUCATION WORKFORCE.
16	Subpart I of part E of title VII of the Public Health
17	Service Act (42 U.S.C. 294n et seq.) is amended—
18	(1) by redesignating the second section 764 (42
19	U.S.C. 294s, as added by section 4 of Public Law
20	117–105) as section 764A; and
21	(2) by inserting after such section 764A, as so
22	redesignated, the following:

1	"SEC. 764B. PROGRAMS TO PROMOTE MENTAL HEALTH
2	AMONG THE EDUCATION WORKFORCE.
3	"(a) Programs to Promote Mental Health
4	Among Education Professionals and Other
5	SCHOOL STAFF.—
6	"(1) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary shall award
7	grants or contracts to eligible entities to establish or
8	enhance evidence-based or evidence-informed pro-
9	grams dedicated to improving mental health and re-
10	siliency for education professionals and other school
11	staff.
12	"(2) Eligibility.—To be eligible to receive a
13	grant or contract under this subsection, an entity
14	shall be a State educational agency, a local edu-
15	cational agency, an institution of higher education,
16	or a consortia thereof.
17	"(3) Use of funds.—An recipient of a grant
18	or contract under this subsection shall use funds re-
19	ceived through the grant or contract to implement a
20	new program or enhance an existing program to pro-
21	mote mental health among education professionals
22	and other school staff, which may include—
23	"(A) improving awareness among edu-
24	cation professionals and other school staff
25	about risk factors for, and signs of, suicide and
26	mental health or substance use disorders, in ac-

1	cordance with evidence-based or evidence-in-
2	formed practices;
3	"(B) establishing new, or enhancing exist-
4	ing, evidence-based or evidence-informed pro-
5	grams for preventing suicide and improving
6	mental health and resiliency among education
7	professionals and other school staff;
8	"(C) establishing new, or enhancing exist-
9	ing, peer-support programs among education
10	professionals and other school staff; or
11	"(D) providing mental health care, follow-
12	up services and care by a licensed or certified
13	mental health professional (including by means
14	of telehealth), or a referral for such care or
15	services by a licensed or certified mental health
16	professional, as appropriate.
17	"(4) Priority.—In awarding grants and con-
18	tracts under this subsection, the Secretary shall give
19	priority to eligible entities in areas with a high per-
20	centage of schools receiving financial assistance
21	under part A of title I of the Elementary and Sec-
22	ondary Education Act of 1965.
23	"(b) Training Grants.—The Secretary may estab-
24	lish a program to award grants to institutions of higher
25	education. State educational agencies, local educational

- 1 agencies, State or local governments, Indian Tribes or
- 2 Tribal organizations, or other appropriate public or pri-
- 3 vate nonprofit entities (or consortia of entities, including
- 4 entities promoting multidisciplinary approaches) to sup-
- 5 port the inclusion in educator preparation programs (in-
- 6 cluding administrator preparation programs), and in
- 7 training, continuing education, or professional develop-
- 8 ment programs for education professionals and other
- 9 school staff, of evidence-based or evidence-informed strate-

- 16 "(c) Grant Terms.—A grant or contract awarded

- 20 mit an application to the Secretary at such time, in such
- 21 manner, and accompanied by such information as the Sec-

4	"(1) The term 'institution of higher education'
5	has the meaning given to such term in section 101
6	of the Higher Education Act of 1965.
7	"(2) The terms 'local educational agency' and
8	'State educational agency' have the meanings given
9	to such terms in section 8101 of the Elementary and
10	Secondary Education Act of 1965.
11	"(g) Authorization of Appropriations.—To
12	carry out this section, there is authorized to be appro-
13	priated \$35,000,000 for each of fiscal years 2024 through
14	2026.".
15	SEC. 5. REVIEW WITH RESPECT TO EDUCATION WORK-
16	FORCE MENTAL HEALTH AND RESILIENCY.
17	(a) In General.—Not later than 2 years after the
18	date of enactment of this Act, the Secretary, in consulta-
19	tion with relevant stakeholders, shall—
20	(1) conduct a review on improving—
21	(A) the mental health of education profes-
22	sionals and other school staff; and
22	
23	(B) the outcomes of programs authorized

1	(2) submit a report to the Congress on the re-
2	sults of such review.
3	(b) Considerations.—The review under subsection
4	(a) may include—
5	(1) assessing the prevalence and severity of
6	mental health conditions among education profes-
7	sionals and other school staff, and determining the
8	factors that contribute to those mental health condi-
9	tions;
10	(2) assessing barriers to seeking and accessing
11	mental health care for education professionals and
12	other school staff, and actions taken by State edu-
13	cational agencies and local educational agencies, or
14	other organizations, as appropriate, to address such
15	barriers;
16	(3) determining the effects of the COVID-19
17	public health emergency on the mental health of
18	education professionals and other school staff and
19	lessons learned for future public health emergencies;
20	(4) assessing programs and policies that pro-
21	mote mental health and resiliency among education
22	professionals and other school staff, including pro-
23	grams and policies to strengthen mental health and
24	resiliency among education professionals and other
25	school staff; and

1	(5) assessing the efficacy of training programs
2	for education professionals and other school staff
3	that promote resiliency and improve mental health.
4	(c) Recommendations.—The review under sub-
5	section (a), as appropriate, shall identify best practices re-
6	lated to, and make recommendations to address—
7	(1) improving mental health and resiliency
8	among education professionals and other school
9	staff;
10	(2) removing barriers to mental health care for
11	education professionals and other school staff; and
12	(3) strategies to promote resiliency among edu-
13	cation professionals and other school staff in health
14	care settings.
15	SEC. 6. GAO REPORT.
16	Not later than 4 years after the date of enactment
17	of this Act, the Comptroller General of the United States
18	shall submit to the Congress a report on the extent to
19	which Federal substance use disorder and mental health
20	grant programs address the prevalence and severity of
21	mental health conditions and substance use disorders
22	among education professionals and other school staff.
23	Such report shall—
24	(1) include an analysis of available evidence and
25	data related to such conditions and programs: and

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- 1 (2) assess whether there are duplicative goals
- 2 and objectives among such grant programs.
