

## Funding to Oregon Counties, Cities, Tribes, and Schools in the American Rescue Plan

*As of March 15, 2021*

Congresswoman Bonamici helped pass the American Rescue Plan, which will provide \$350 billion in new Coronavirus Relief Funds for states, localities, Tribes, and schools. The funding is to help keep essential services running and address increased costs and lost revenue as a result of the pandemic. Local governments employ essential workers such as frontline health care workers, police, firefighters, transit workers, teachers, and others who help keep us safe. Since the pandemic began, millions of these workers have lost their jobs nationwide.

The state and local funds included in the American Rescue Plan may also be used to invest in water, sewer, and broadband infrastructure, as well as for premium pay up to \$13 an hour in additional wages for many workers performing essential functions during the pandemic. Funds cannot be used for pensions or for tax cuts.

In total, Oregon will receive an estimated \$4.262 Billion in Coronavirus Relief Funds.

The state will also receive \$155 million from the Coronavirus Capital Projects Fund. In addition, the American Rescue Plan reserves \$20 billion from the total State Fiscal Recovery Fund for all federally recognized Tribes. Meaningful consultation is an important step for distribution of these funds.

More details about the state and local funding:

- These amounts are estimates based on analysis of the American Rescue Plan by the House Committee on Oversight and Reform. The funding amounts are derived from formulas in the legislation and based on 2020 HUD data.
- Governments will receive their allocations in two tranches—the first fifty percent approximately 60 days after the bill is enacted, and the other fifty percent one year later. States, counties, and larger cities will have to submit a certification of need to the US Treasury Department.
- Counties and larger cities, which in NW Oregon includes Portland, Hillsboro, and Beaverton, will receive funds directly from the US Treasury Department.
- States will receive funds for all other cities and then distribute them. The state has an additional 30 days to distribute those funds and does not have authority to change funding levels.
- Funds must be spent by December 31, 2024.

As a leader on the Education and Labor Committee, Congresswoman Bonamici worked diligently to secure the resources schools need to reopen safely, provide more in-person instruction to more students, and address the significant effect of COVID-19 on the education and well-being of Oregon’s students. Congresswoman Bonamici successfully advocated for \$130 billion in funding for public education, including \$1,156,229,000 for K-12 education in Oregon.

Below is a table with estimated allocations for school districts in NW Oregon. These funds can be used to reduce class sizes, implement social distancing guidelines, repair or replace school ventilation systems, address the needs of homeless students and students with disabilities, and support summer enrichment activities.

More details about the education funding:

- 20 percent of funding must be used to address learning loss
- States must award funds to districts no later than 60 days after receipt
- School districts must develop plans to return to in-person learning
